To register, visit-12 brattleboromuseum.org or call 802-257-0124, ext. 101. 13 14 This event is a sequel of sorts to the January 2025 15 program "Island: A Conversation," which emerged from the 16 exhibition "Susan Mikula: ISLANDsland," on view at BMAC from 17 October 2024 through February 2025. 18 The Bellows Falls Island, a 30-acre shelf of bedrock 19 along the Connecticut River, has been defined by human 20 manipulation for centuries. It was once has been a ceremonial, 21 gathering, and burial site for Indigenous inhabitants of the region\_ 22 for thousands of years. Originally a peninsula bounded on three sides by the 24 river, it became an island in 1802 with the creation of the 25 Bellows Falls Canal. Railroads, resort hotels, farm machinery, 26 armament manufacturers, paper mills, and busy roadways have 27 come and gone, while the Island continues to hold traces of its 28 layered past. 29 The Bellows Falls Waypoint Center, which was designed 30 by Scully, opened in 2003 in connection with the Federal 31 Highways National Scenic Byways Program to provide visitors a 32 window to the past and a jumping off point to explore the 33 Connecticut River Valley. Scully will share the inspiration behind 34 the design of the center, highlighting how the Island's unique 35 character influenced his design of the building itself. 36 "We're excited to build on the rich dialogue that began 37 last winter," said McBride in a news release. "Susan Mikula's 38 photographs stimulated new interest in the history and identity of 39 the Island. This symposium allows us to keep that conversation 40 going with fresh perspectives from experts in geology, 41 archaeology, and architecture." 42 Admission is free, but space is limited, so advance 43 registration is required.
