4 **Brattleboro winter parking ban now in effect**

5 BRATTLEBORO — The Town of Brattleboro's annual
6 winter parking ban went into effect on Nov. 15 and will remain
7 in effect through April 15, 2026. The ban is in place regardless of
8 weather conditions.

9 Per Ordinance Sec. 16-93: Parking is prohibited on all
10 public streets in Brattleboro between 12:01 a.m. and 7 a.m.

11 Vehicles found in violation may be ticketed and towed at the
12 owner's expense. The Transportation Center and other designated
13 municipal lots remain available for overnight parking unless
14 otherwise posted.

15 Per Ordinance Sec. 16-94: It shall be unlawful for a
16 vehicle to park in a way that blocks or hinders snow plowing or
17 snow removal operations. Any vehicle that interferes with the
18 Department of Public Works' ability to clear the streets is subject
19 to citation and removal.

20 Additionally, per Ordinance Sec. 16-96: After a snowfall
21 that requires clean-up, residents may park in the covered area of
22 the Transportation Center. Overflow parking is allowed in the
23 Preston Lot, but vehicles there must be moved by 8 a.m.

24 When amber lights are flashing, all uncovered municipal
25 lots are closed for snow removal from 12:01 to 7 a.m., and
26 vehicles left there will be ticketed and towed.

27 When purple lights are flashing downtown, no street
28 parking is allowed in the Downtown District from 11 p.m. to 7
29 a.m. to allow for snow removal. Vehicles left on downtown
30 streets during this time will be ticketed and towed.

36 BRATTLEBORO — The town of Brattleboro's reappraisal
37 is underway. The public is invited to learn and to ask questions
38 about this process during a special Selectboard meeting
39 scheduled for Thursday, Nov. 20, at 6:15 p.m. in the Selectboard
40 Meeting Room.

41 Ryan Silvestri from New England Municipal Consultants,
42 who will be managing the reappraisal, along with representatives
43 from the Brattleboro Assessor's Office, will provide an overview
44 of the project and what to expect during the coming years as the
45 consultants conduct property inspections.

46 There will not be a Zoom component to this meeting. A
47 recording will be made available on YouTube. Information and
48 updates about this project will be posted on
49 Brattleboro.gov/reappraisal. The Selectboard Meeting Room is
50 located on the second floor of the Municipal Center, 230 Main
51 St.

77 release. “It also raises awareness about the violence and
78 discrimination that this community faces across the world, and is
79 a reminder for everyone to continue the work for justice.”

81 and remember together. Participants will share poetry of trans
82 writers, sing together, and lift up the names of those trans people
83 whose lives were lost. The evening will end by sharing a simple
