80 ***Dummerston Cares offers smoke, carbon
81 monoxide detectors for homes***

82 DUMMERSTON — Once again, residents have an
83 opportunity to keep themselves and their families safe from house
84 fires. Dummerston Cares is continuing to accept requests for its
85 "Raise the Alarm" program, through a partnership with the
86 Dummerston Volunteer Fire Department (DVFD).

87 If you're a Dummerston resident living in an owner-
88 occupied, single-family home, you are eligible to receive smoke
89 alarms (with 10-year batteries) and carbon monoxide detectors.
90 These safety devices and the installation by trained DVFD
91 firefighters are free.

92 Sign up for upgrading current devices or installing first
93 devices can be arranged by leaving name and phone number on
94 the Cares Message Line at 802-257-5800. A Cares volunteer will
95 be in touch to complete the application. Installations take place
96 on Saturdays between 9 a.m and noon and usually take less than
97 30 minutes.

98 ***State warns of scammers targeting
99 3SquaresVT recipients***

100 WATERBURY — The Vermont Agency of Human
101 Services' Department for Children and Families (DCF) have
102 issued a warning that there are scammers calling and messaging
103 some recipients of 3SquaresVT food assistance, telling them that
104 their EBT Cards are "locked" and asking them to call a number to
105 verify eligibility.

106 DCF's Economic Services Department (ESD), the
107 administrators of the 3SquaresVT program, said in a news release
108 they "will never text or call people with this message." They
109 advise to hang up on suspicious calls and contact ESD at 800-

110 479-6151 to verify your account. EBT cardholders can check
111 their balance at ebtedge.com or by calling 1-800-914-8605.

112 If anyone has been a victim of this scam, they should
113 contact ESD at 800-479-6151 or call 2-1-1 and ask for their local
114 Community Action Agency. Older adults can call The Helpline at
115 800-642-5119.

138 WESTMINSTER — Southeastern Vermont Community
139 Action (SEVCA) is launching its annual year-end appeal that is an

141 support individuals and families across Windham and Windsor
142 counties.

143 As rising housing costs, higher utility bills, and food
144 insecurity continue to strain Vermonters. SEVCA remains a trusted
145 anchor organization—providing a range of support from
146 emergency help when the ground shifts to long-term support that
147 helps people build stability.

148 “This fall, we’ve seen how quickly stability can crack —
149 one unexpected bill, one lost paycheck, and the ground shifts
150 beneath an individual or family’s feet,” Executive Director Joshua
151 Davis said in a news release. “In moments like these, having
152 somewhere steady to turn makes all the difference.”

153 For this year’s appeal, SEVCA said it has received a
154 \$25,000 challenge grant from the Thomas Thompson Trust
155 (thomasthompsontrust.org). The grant unlocks once SEVCA raises
