21 Spectators are welcome, and attendees are encouraged to bring
22 lawn chairs, bug repellent, and croquet sets and mallets, if
23 available.

24 Upon registration, participants will receive the game
25 rules, diagrams for the three backyard croquet fields, and other
26 helpful hints. St. Luke's volunteers will lay out the field(s),
27 coach/teach/ref/explain scoring, and keep statistics. St. Luke's has
28 modified the Palm Beach U.S. Croquet Association rules over the
29 years to make community games easier, clearer, and more social.

30 At the end of the season, a Potluck Awards Banquet
